Po přednášce z 26. ledna 2006 o inkorporacích na farní úrovni, která se konala na KTF UK v Praze a o níž jsme informovali v minulém čísle, následovala dne 25. dubna 2006 v čítárně pražského dominikánského kláštera prezentace knihy ICDr. JUDr. Stanislava Příbyla, Ph.D., která právě vyšla pod názvem *Ekumenismus a právo jako první svazek ediční řady vydávané Husitskou teologickou fakultou Univerzity Karlovy pod názvem Deus et gentes*. From the Church Law Society

Lectures from the Lecture Series *The Effects of Law on Society and the Church*

In the previous volume of the Review we reported on the conference on incorporations at the parish level that took place on 26 January 2006 in the Catholic Theological School of Charles University. This conference was followed on 25 April 2006 by a presentation of the new book by ICDr. JUDr. Stanislav Příbyl, Ph.D. The book, entitled *The Ecumenism and the Law*, was published as the first book in the series *Deus et gentes* of the Hussite Theological School of Charles University. This series represents a new stage in the publishing activities of the School following the successful line of books previously published by the School, particularly the books in the *Pontes Pragenses* series.

The introduction to the presentation was given by Doc. ThDr. Jan Blahoslav Lášek, a Vice-Dean of the Hussite Theological School of Charles University. He presented not only the newly issued book but also the various individual edition series of the School. Stanislav Příbyl, the author, later gave a lecture – an introduction to the issue. There was a lively discussion following the lecture which included, among other participants, Štěpán Klásek, a Bishop of the Czechoslovak Hussite Church in Hradec Králové. We provide more information about the book in Abstracts and Recensions in this volume of the Review.

Brief News

The Conference of the Collaborators in the Grant Project *The Czechoslovak Law and Legal Science Between the World Wars* in Herbertov

On 4–6 April 2006 a conference was held for those who are collaborating in the grant project *The Czechoslovak Law and Legal Science Between the World Wars (1918–1939) and its Position in Central Europe*. The conference took place in the Český Krumlov district in the recreation facility of the Czech Technical University in Herbertov. The conference was chaired by Professor JUDr. Dr.h.c. Karel Malý, DrSc., the Director of the Legal History Institute of the Law School of Charles University in Prague and President Emeritus of Charles University, who is also the leader of the grant project. The conference was attended by representatives of law schools from the Czech Republic and Slovakia, the Czech Academy of Sciences, the Max Planck Institute for European Legal History in Frankfurt am Main and many other institutions.

The purpose of the grant project, which has been supported by the Grant Agency of the Czech Republic, is to provide a complete picture of the law and legal science in the period of the First Czechoslovak Republic in 1918–1938. The project team members will prepare analyses of the individual fields of law in the Czechoslovak Republic (legal history, Roman law, church law and state law on churches, civil law, commercial, criminal, administrative, constitutional law, etc.). The results will be presented at an international conference planned for September 2008 and will be published in a collection.

A second publication, which is being prepared by a collective of authors, is an anthology of the Czechoslovak legal science in 1918–1938 and includes texts on the lives and work of the important representatives of Czechoslovak legal science who worked in that period, regardless of their nationality. In addition to Czech and Slovak scientists, there are also experts from Germany, Poland, Austria and Hungary cooperating in this project.

The Meeting of the Academic Council of the Czech Christian Academy

On Saturday, 10 June 2006, a regular meeting of the Academic Council took place in the main hall of the Emauzy Monastery in Prague. The Council is a “senate” meeting of the president, vice-presidents, general director, other employees

of the center of the Academy and also directors and other representatives of 13 sections of the Academy and 66 local groups.

In the first of three parts of the meeting the activities of the Academy since the previous meeting at the end of 2005 were evaluated; also, the 2005 economic report was presented.

At the end of the first part of the meeting the president of the Academy, Professor ThDr. PhDr. Tomáš Halík, congratulated Doc. JUDr. Jiří Rajmund Tretera for the affirmative decision in his professorship candidacy at Charles University, particularly for his receiving an absolute majority of votes of the members of the Scientific Council of Charles University. The voting took place after an academic discussion held in the Karolinum on Thursday, 25 May 2006.

In the second part of the meeting, a significant number of new individual members were accepted to the Academy and a new – 67th – local group was established in Milín. Local groups are being created in various towns and larger villages throughout the Czech Republic. At the beginning, starting in 1990, groups were being established only in Bohemia, but in the past few years since an agreement with the Moravian-Silesian Christian Academy was reached, the Czech Christian Academy may also establish local groups in Moravia and Silesia. This is now happening, and it is hoped that the Czech Christian Academy will continue to enlarge its activities not only in subject-matter but also geographically. At almost every meeting of the Academic Council consent is given for the establishment of one or more new local groups in Bohemia, Moravia and Silesia.

In the third part of the Council meeting the representatives of the expert sections and local groups from the entire country presented their 2005 activity reports. Doc. JUDr. Jiří Rajmund Tretera, the director of the legal section of the Czech Christian Academy, presented a brief report about the events organized by the Church Law Society, which is not only a corporate member of the Czech Christian Academy but also acts as its legal section.

The Cathedral of the Prague Archdiocese Belongs to the Church

Czech daily newspapers reported that on 16 June 2006 the City Court of Prague finalized a thirteen-year-old lawsuit regarding the ownership of the Cathedral of the Prague Archdiocese and its adjacent buildings. The Court ruled on the ownership in favour of the Church legal entities. We reported about the then newly-opened proceedings in the matter before the Court in the Church Law Review No. 32 – 3/05, p. 279.
